Activities Combating Chronic Malnutrition



Prenatal Care

Our prenatal program provides ongoing assistance to expectant families.

- **In-home consultations with healthcare professionals**
- **Transportation to the hospital for delivery**
- **Fertilizer assistance to increase agricultural output**



San Yves Nutrition Center

We collaborate and co-fund the nutrition center with the Yoro community to address current chronic malnutrition.

- **24-hour care by trained professional staff**
- **Nutritional support for severely malnourished children**
- **Routine medical exams and bloodwork**



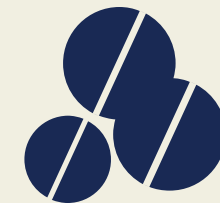
Measuring Our Efforts in 2021

Our topline objective year after year is to reduce chronic childhood malnutrition in the region of Yoro, Honduras. In 2021, due to our intervention, 25 children have recovered from severe malnutrition.

42 Families in prenatal program

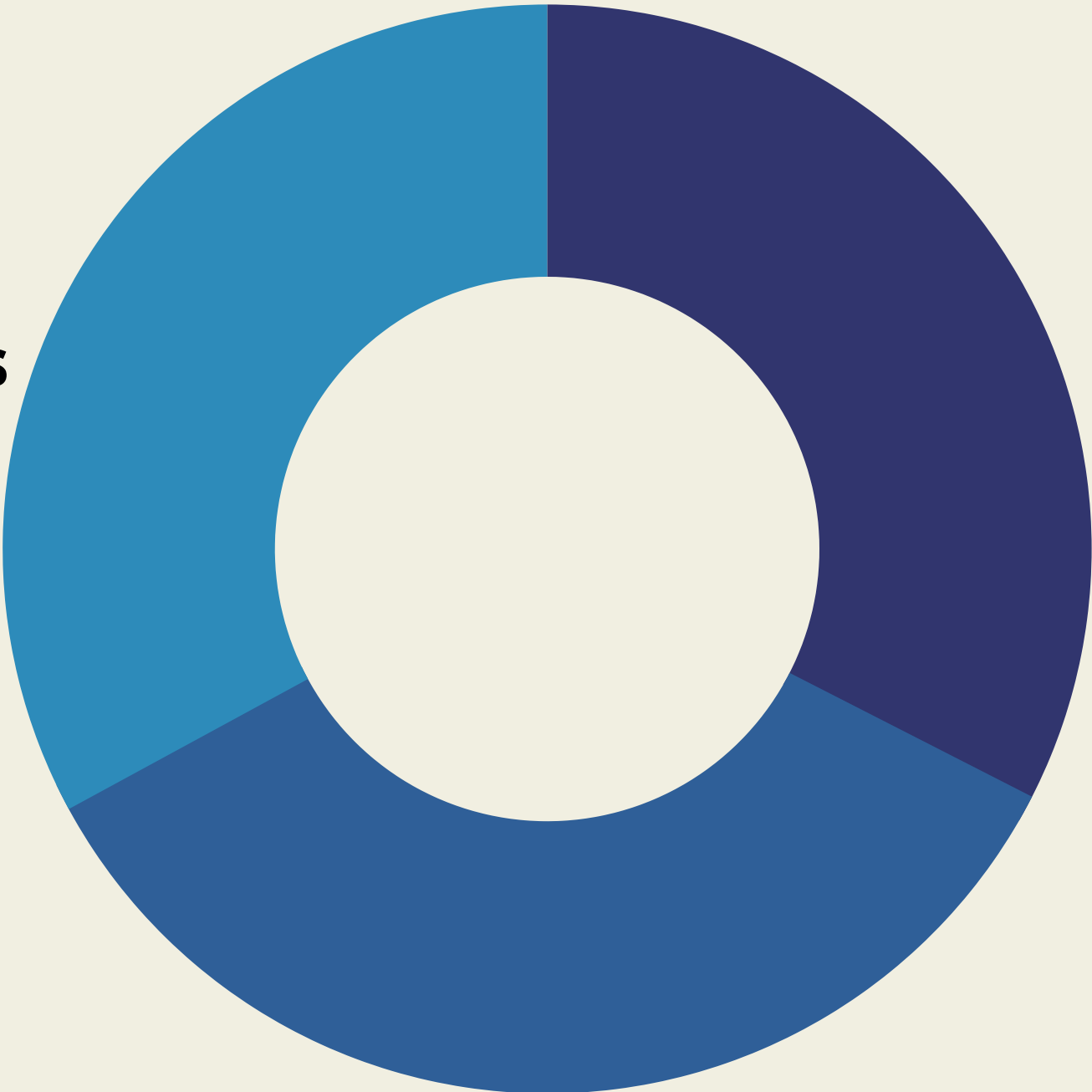

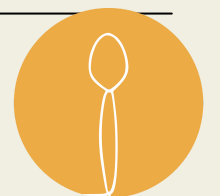

Prenatal Care Program

In April of 2021, NutriFund launched a new program focusing on the root causes of childhood malnutrition. The health of a baby depends greatly on the health of the mother before, during and after pregnancy. The program consists of the following activities:

- Regular home visits by staff to build trust in the community, to provide basic education on prenatal health and to collect data
- Transportation and coordination of doctors visits, ultrasounds and births in the hospital
- Distribution of prenatal vitamins
- Returnable grants of fertilizer to increase agricultural output and stimulate economic development

STAFF

We employ two health promoters who carry out regular, household visits for the prenatal program.

TRANSPORT

Remoteness of communities plays a significant role in the level of poverty. Transportation costs cover our staff, as well as fund bus passes or car rides for women in the program to get to a doctor.

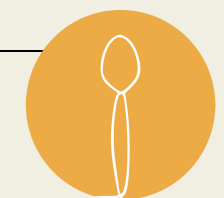
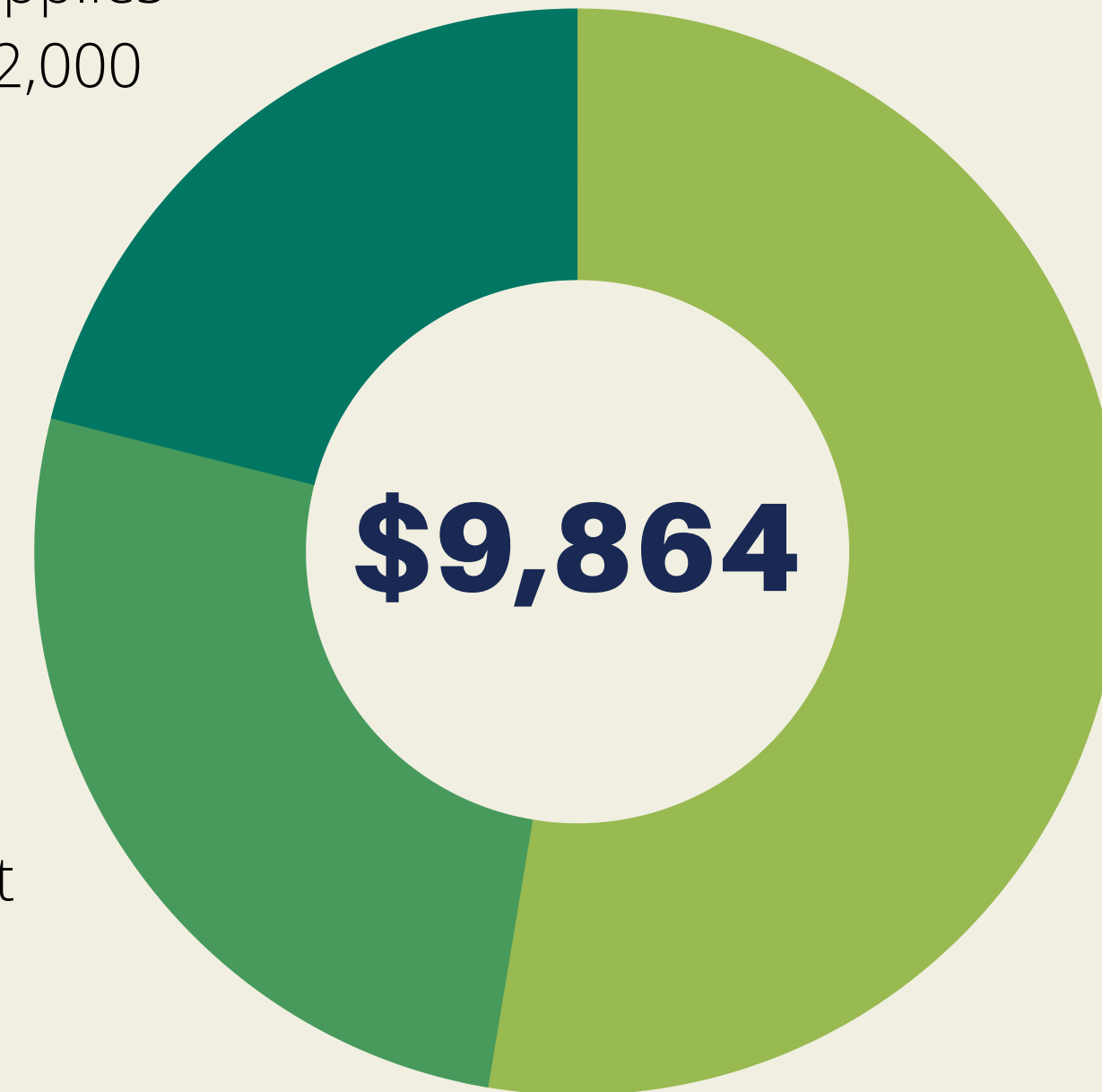

Impact of the Prenatal Care Program

Regina had never given birth in the hospital due to the high cost of travel and necessary supplies. For her first two pregnancies, she sporadically took prenatal vitamins and gave birth at home.

Her third pregnancy was one of the first that our prenatal program was able to assist, ensuring access to care previously unavailable to her.

Regina gave birth for the first time in the hospital. She and her child are both in great health.

San Yves Nutrition Center

Our in-country partner, the San Yves Nutrition Center, is a Honduran organization operating a 24-hour care facility for severely malnourished children for nearly thirty years.

Having a well established in-country partner is paramount to the success of our mission. San Yves' proximity to and history of combating malnutrition makes the nutrition center well-equipped to identify problems and solutions on the ground.

In 2021, NutriFund provided a general operating grant to the nutrition center to match local funding. Our support improved access to foods and medicines and allowed San Yves to hire additional competitively paid staff to ensure higher quality care for the children living at the nutrition center.

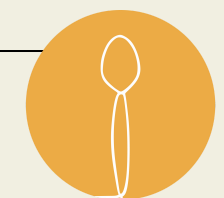


Impact of the San Yves Nutrition Center

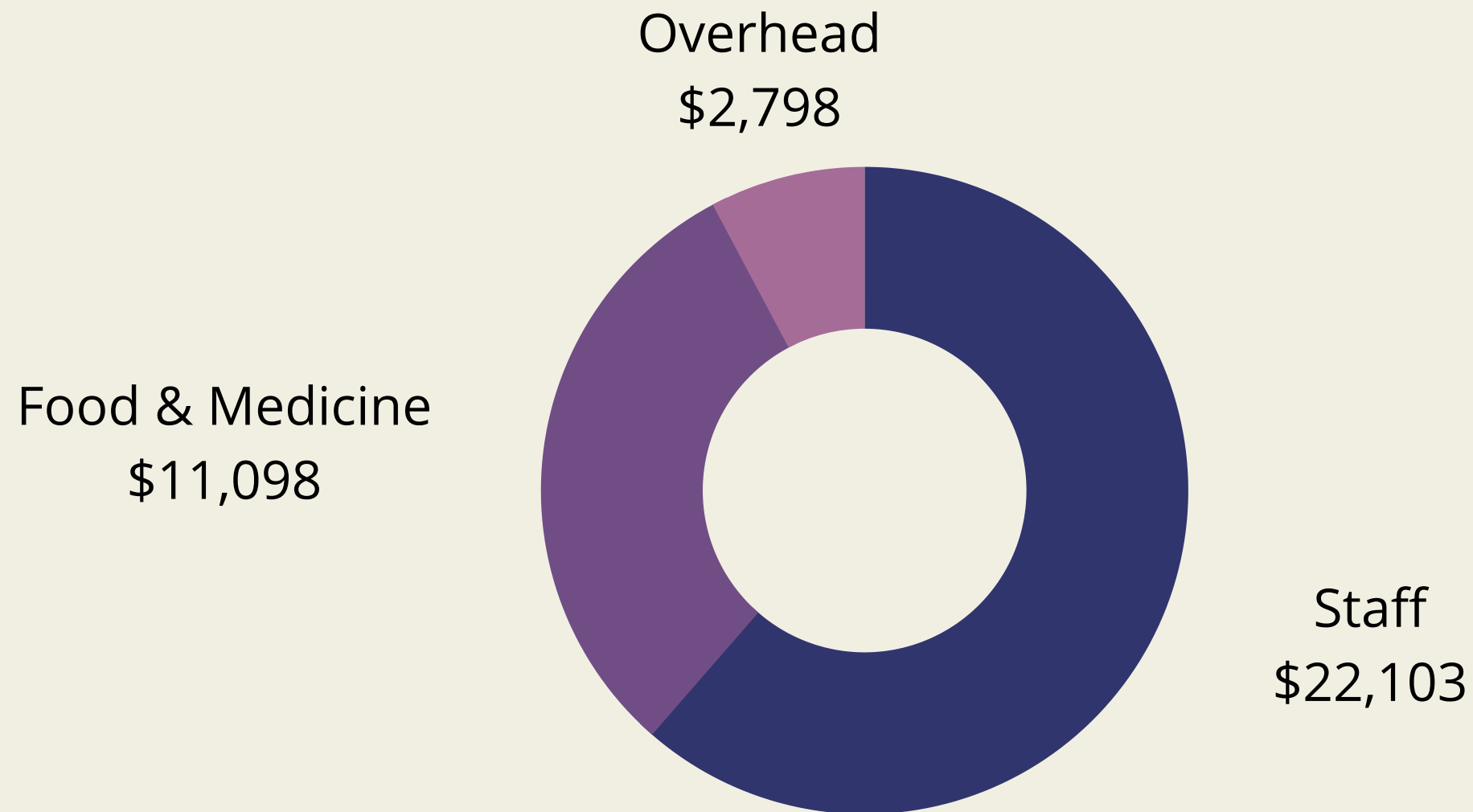
Andrea arrived at the nutrition center life-threateningly malnourished. She was 15 months old, but barely had the strength to sit upright. She had severe anemia and as a result almost no energy, passing most of the day laying down or sleeping. She weighed just 15 pounds.

Her recovery was slow. She had no appetite, nor the energy to sit for an extended period of time to eat. The women at the nutrition center worked tirelessly, and with the assistance of some high-calorie food supplements, Andrea began to gain weight. After four months, she had gained ten pounds.

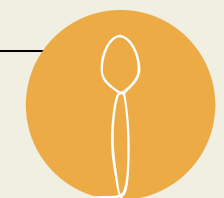
FOOD & MEDICINE
